This was a great time for all and there are photos of FHYC skippers Dave Brown and Jim Fortuna enjoying the Beer Garden there to prove it.

Congratulations to Eric Frank and crew Jerry Rezab. They were the top FHYC finishers in our Oar Race, sailing Eric's F27 trimaran, Sweet Alice. The overall winner was Tom McKnight in his New Bern-built classic San Juan 30. Tom and his crew kept an unbeatable pace through the midday doldrums. Although there was a good breeze at the start, the wind dropped off and the Oar Race this year finished at Minnesott Point instead of Oriental.

We've had some beautiful weather with perfect days for sailing or cruising. As the river water warms up, our boat engine has tended to run hot, which is not good. Looking for a solution (pardon the pun), I spent most of a week crouching in the engine room. After draining and flushing the cooling system, cleaning the heat exchanger tubes, re-assembling the cooling system and refilling it, the engine runs again, although still warmer than I like. Fortunately, it's not as close to actual overheat as before.

Summer also brings us into the

season of hurricanes. Preparing your boat is the key to avoiding damage or even total loss. While the horizon is clear, now is the time to assemble the gear you need: additional dock lines and chafing gear at a minimum. If you intend to anchor out, you will need at least two heavy storm anchors and ground tackle. The good thing about hurricanes is that we generally have several days warning; sometimes five or six in the case of a major hurricane coming from the Caribbean. This allows us to plan and prioritize the best way to protect our families and homes as well as our boats.

For our June General Meeting, the Medical Minute covered 'Recognizing a Heart Attack.' A transcript is included in this newsletter. We also had a program on safety and law enforcement presented by Master Officer Kyle Van Althuis of the N.C. Wildlife Service. This state agency is responsible for hunting as well as onwater enforcement. The program focused on the problem of boating accidents and alcohol consumption while afloat. While nobody was surprised to hear about alcohol's negative effects, the severity and the

rapid onset of these effects was news to many members. It takes the body over an hour to clear the effects of one drink of alcohol; this time is cumulative and there is no way to hasten the process. Most of us do not imbibe while underway, and much to our relief Bill Jarvis asked the question on everybody's mind: if your boat is safely anchored, is it OK to relax with a drink? Officer Althuis affirmed so.

We have some great upcoming events. The July 4 Fireworks cruise led by Don Knight will go to downtown New Bern. Brian Giersch will lead a long weekend cruise to Cape Lookout, which is one of the best local destinations you could ask for. The Three Dinner Cruise, which includes the Shrimparoo, will be coming up shortly also. We will have had an Impromptu Raft-Up, providently on a nearly-full-moon evening, and another will be coming up soon by the time you read this.

Brief Reminder: the next General Meeting will be held in the Blackbeard Sailing Club clubhouse. There will be a Swap Meet beforehand, so if you have nautical items to trade, if you are looking for some, or if you have some

Missed earlier opportunities to get out to this pristine location? Never been there before? First time and would like the company of others to help get there with confidence? Got some time for a few days of fun and nature's treats? Then mark your calendar for Thursday, July 13 through Monday, July 20 and let's go to Cape Lookout!

As we anticipate dates and put them on our own calendars, be mindful that allowance should be made for weather days and a watchful eye must be attentive to nor'easters and tropical depressions.

#### Don't Be A Hot Head!

Internal combustion engines have a reputation for being fussy. As an engineer who spent much of my working life around steam plants, I can tell you that external combustion engines have their issues too. That's a topic for another day. If you boat has an engine, that engine has a cooling system which is vital to proper performance. Many engines run with chronic mild overheat, which can cause a lot of annoying symptoms. This is easily avoidable! Serious overheat can destroy an engine, in which case you get a new one and start over again.

Most of us know to look for the outflow of cooling water, this is true with outboards and inboards. However, do you know how to replace the raw water impeller? This is the little gizmo that spins with the engine, forcing water from outside the hull thru the engine (in the case of raw water cooling, which is true of outboards and some older inboards) or the heat exchanger which plays the same role as the radiator in your car. Impellers have only a given working life and they enjoy being retired. If they are forced to work too long, they take vengeance on your engine. It's not difficult to change them, so make this step part of your routine maintenance.

Our own boat, a 2000 year model Albin 31 with a Catarpillar 3126, has tended to run hot which is not good. As the river water gets warmer and warmer in summer, approaching the mid-80s F, it could be a severe problem and engines like this are extremely expensive. The first part was to examine the technical manuals for our engine, but there was little help there.

Crouching in the engine room, tracing out the coolant plumbing, I finally located the coolant drain. This was difficult to access and almost impossible to place a drain pan under. In my usual impatient manner, I grabbed some flexible plastic quart jugs and squeezed them into the space one by one. This was tedious and painful, considering that our engine holds almost six gallons of coolant. However it was necessary because engine coolant is a serious pollutant and I want to keep our local waters clean & healthy.

The brown glop which drained out of the engine convinced me that it should have been changed MUCH sooner. Now, after flushing the cooling system, cleaning the heat exchanger tubes, re-assembling and refilling the cooling system, the engine runs again.

It's still warmer than I'd like but not as close to actual overheat.

# **Medical Minute**

In 2016, data in European Heart Journal from England from April 2004 to March 2013 showed that onethird of heart attacks (AMI) initially were misdiagnosed. Women had a 59% greater chance of misdiagnosis for ST segment elevation MI and 41% for non ST segment elevation MI than men.

A recent article in Lancet reviewed all 135,950 deaths from AMI in England from 2006 to 2010. Of these patients, 51% had not been admitted to the hospital in previous 28 days, 20% were admitted with MI diagnosed on first encounter with physician, 4% on subsequent encounter, 9% with cardiac co-morbid conditions and 16% with no mention of heart symptoms in hospital record. Of the latter group 35% had circulatory system diagnosis, 6% nonspecific chest complaints and 12% respiratory disorders.

What is the problem? Heart attack symptoms are not just classic chest pressure, tightness or squeezing. Other symptoms include pain traveling from chest to arms, jaw, back or neck, feeling lightheaded or dizzy, nausea and vomiting, sweating, shortness of breath, overwhelming sense of anxiety, and coughing or wheezing. If you suspect a heart attack call 911.
