Let Fred know if you are planning to participate and the skippers' meeting will be set up. There is no planned cruise to Annapolis. The Albemarle Loop Cruise is coming up in October led by Ritchie Thomson. The date for this event was changed so as not to conflict with the Fall Appreciation Dinner. Short days of cruising are planned.

Entertainment - Rose Litke reminded members that next week is Trivia Night. Karen Meyer reminded everyone of the event and that it is a social event, not a "tryout for Jeopardy," so it should be a fun evening starting at 1730. Catering by Posh Palate (formerly Sweet Pea). Cape Lookout Cruise

Missed earlier opportunities to get out to this pristine location? Never been there before? First time and would like the company of others to help get there with confidence? Got some time for a few days of fun and nature's treats? Then mark your calendar for Saturday, September 30, through Wednesday, October 4 and let's go to Cape Lookout!

Worried about Fall temperatures? Remember the ocean temps will still be warm, giving you comfortable days AND nights! And sea breezes will keep the afternoon thunderstorms inland!

As we anticipate dates and put them on our own calendars, be mindful that allowances should be made for 'weather days' and a watchful eye must be attentive to nor'easters and tropical depressions.

Itinerary: Saturday - Depart Fairfield Harbour, run down Adams Creek and anchor in Town Creek (if you're not going all the way); Sunday Morning -Time the departure to catch the slack current in the Beaufort Inlet, then sail off to the Cape Lookout Bight and start exploring; Sunday and Monday -Continue exploring; Tuesday - Depart for Cedar Creek for an overnight anchorage (unless you're going all the way); Wednesday - Return home.

Medical Minute: Stroke

Impending or evolving stroke should be treated with the urgency of a heart attack: a stroke is a "brain attack." Your role in detecting stroke is the most important step in the American Heart Association's Chain of Survival.

Remember the acronym FAST: Face droop (ask your friend to smile); Arm weakness (ask for extended arms to test resistance to downward pressure); Speech difficulty (ask your friend to say "you can't teach an old dog new tricks"); and Time - get your friend to medical care as soon as possible.

Most strokes are ischemic (87%) and are treated with "clot-busters." Hospitals have strict guidelines for time to exam (10 minutes), CT scan (25 minutes), and initiation of therapy (1 hour from arrival to ED): the fibrinolytic must be given within 3 hours from onset of symptoms, so don't delay at home! If a stroke is hemorrhagic, a neurosurgeon will become involved.

Several FHYC members can testify that following this advice is worthwhile. Remember to act FAST!

Albemarle Loop Cruise 2017

Following our successful late season cruise to the Pamlico River last year, we are planning a cruise to the Albemarle Sound for this fall. Please note that the dates shown in the FHYC calendar have been modified to allow members to attend the Fall Appreciation Dinner on Wednesday, October 18, before departing the following morning. Now you have no excuse for not attending!

We plan to leave Fairfield Harbour on Thursday, October 19, gathering in either Lower Broad Creek or South River, depending on the winds, weather and what people want. On the morning of Friday, October 20, we plan to head up through the Bay River and over to Belhaven. We will then proceed gently northwards through the Pungo - Alligator canal and up into the Albemarle Sound. In the Sound we will have the opportunity to visit among other places:

Manteo (possibly returning via the Pamlico Sound and Ocracoke)

Every marina in the Albemarle Loop group offers at least 48 hours of FREE slip rental, fresh water, and pump outs where available. For details see their website at http://www.albemarleloop.com/index.html. There are also many opportunities to anchor out.

This is a great opportunity to follow in the footsteps of America's first English settlers.

The specific destinations for each day will be decided by group consensus on a day-by-day basis. It may mean moving on or staying put to wait for weather to pass or just to hang out for a day. You are welcome to join for part or all of the cruise as you wish. A SPLASH at the docks or on a boat is a must each day! There are many restaurants to visit in the various ports.
