Different cruises will be announced during the year and published in the calendar of events; Entertainment: Rose Voss-Litke and her committee have been busy planning wonderful social events during the year with 8 events on the schedule. Not enough room to swing a cat

It was often thought that anyone who used this term should be reported to the SPCA. The cat we're talking about here is not the friendly family housecat, but the very unfriendly cat'-o'nine-tails.

The latter cat was used as the principal means of punishment in almost every navy in the world in the days of sail. It was made of nine lengths of

cord or rawhide. Each of these was about eighteen inches long and had three knots tied in the end. The nine "tails" were attached to a larger rope, which served as a handle.
