Reaching for the radio, he says: "Change your course 10 degrees east".


Change yours 10 degrees west, "comes the reply.

The captain is furious. "I'm a battleship! I'm not changing course!"

The seaman replies, "I'm in a light-house. Your call."



Flag Etiquette

Last year after Commissioning Day, I was told by a few people that they thought some of our members were lacking proper flag etiquette.

Here are a few reminders:

FHYC Burgee: Power boats - on the bow or mast if the trawler has a mast. Sailing boats - either from the starboard spreader or from a pig stick at the top of the mast

Flags for Past Commodore, Board, and Bridge should be below the FHYC burgee.

US Flag: Power boats - typically from the stern, but with trawlers, it may be from the mast. Sailing boats may fly the US flag two thirds of the way up the back of the main sail

An Ensign: two thirds up the back of the mast

Alphabet flags: usually from the bow to the top of the highest mast, then to a second mast if there is one, and down to the stern

There is no place on Commissioning Day for cocktail, pirate or political flags

If you are spelling out some message, the flags generally are from the port spreader

MAN-OVER-BOARD DRILL

Always WEAR YOUR LIFE JACKET when onboard

EVERYONE onboard should have a life jacket including children and pets

INSTRUCT one person onboard to point out where the victim went overboard

Show EVERYONE onboard where the MOB (man over board) button on the chart plotter is and how to use it.

If you fall over board, DON'T PANIC

REDUCE loss of body heat with the H.E.L.P. position (draw knees up to body)

All life jackets should have an attached whistle and water proof flashlight

BLOW the whistle day or night

USE the flashlight at night

Victims, who conserved energy, remained afloat and stayed near where they fell in, were more likely to be successfully rescued.

The best option is not to fall overboard in the first place.

Do you know the origin of the phrase....

"THE SUN IS OVER THE YARDARM"

By definition, a traditional nautical saying to indicate that it is time for a morning drink.

The yardarms on a sailing ship are the horizontal timbers or spars mounted on the masts, from which the square sails are hung. It was generally assumed in northern latitudes the sun would show above the foreyard (topmost yardarm) of a ship by 1100, which was about the time in many ships of the forenoon 'standeasy'. Many officers and their men would slip below for their first drink of the day (the officers had their tots neat, the men's diluted). It seems that officers in sailing ships adopted a custom, **even when on shore**, of waiting until this time before taking their first alcoholic drink of the day.
