

Emergency Rescue Box

Thanks to Ritchie Thomson, the Regatta Committee now has a place to store all the accoutrements for their races and the Emergency Rescue Box that will accompany any of the race mark boats. It's not quite ready for prime time but when it is, race personnel will be able to stop at the box and pick up their necessary equipment and head out for a race. The box will be secured with a combination lock. Each mark boat will be given that combination. Equipment will then be returned to the box and locked up after the race.

The Emergency Rescue Box was one of the suggestions of the Joint Task Force, recommending that certain water rescue supplies such as blankets and dry clothing, be kept on one of the boats during a race. Blackbeard Sailing Club has a similar box for races sponsored by them as well. This was a sailing community effort and is much appreciated by the boaters in our area.

Lessons Learned

This March 22 will mark a year since the sinking of the ensign, Mutiny, in the Neuse River putting the four crew members in the water. Fairfield Harbour Yacht Club and Blackbeard Sailing Club formed a Task Force to look at lessons learned and to address inadequacies in water rescue procedures in our area. The purpose of this article is to remind people about steps they can take to have a safe outing on our waterways. The following are just a few of the lessons learned and apply to any size or type of boat, sail or power.

Anytime you are on the water, wear your PFD. Stowing it neatly on the boat and "out of the way" while out on the water isn't going to help you if you find yourself in the water and your PFD is on the boat.

It is the responsibility of the skip-

per to make sure all people on board know where the MOB (Man Over Board) button is. They should also know where the marine radio is and how to use it in case of an emergency.

Along with wearing the PFD, everyone on board should carry appropriate waterproof, accessible signal devices tethered to their person. Something as simple as a whistle helps.

If you take medications you should carry a list of medications and their dosage in a waterproof bag so it's available to emergency personnel should it be needed during a rescue.

Below is a reference to an article I read about the Chicago/Mackinaw race on Lake Michigan. It shows that even with very experienced sailors, weather can become a very dangerous and immediate factor. Happy Boating.

Shakedown and Wine Tasting Cruise

Race Management Seminar

On March 9, Charlie Nelson and Blackbeard Sailing Club (BSC) hosted a Race Management Seminar at BSC's Clubhouse. Participants came from BSC, FHYC, and Oriental Yacht Club (OYC). It began at 1130 with Bill Jarvis as principal instructor.

The seminar began with a power point presentation that described mark boats and signal (committee) boats, their necessary equipment, and responsibilities on race day. Bill also used a "Sailing Instructions" handout, explaining all the pertinent information that can be found therein. Race flags were also discussed. After the inside instruction was finished, the 42 participants broke for lunch of 9 delicious Big Apple pizzas, beer, soda and assorted cookies. Networking among the yacht club members occurred during the lunch.

Later everyone moved outside on BSC's grounds and broke into mini

groups for hands-on practice time. Instructors for the 4 small groups were from BSC and FHYC. Practice covered proper mark placement: how to set a mark, how to measure distance from the signal boat to where the mark is placed and inflating/deflating marks. The seminar ended mid-afternoon.

We anticipate that this seminar will make it easier to recruit more mark and signal boats for races, whether it's one race you can help with or the whole series. We'd love to hear from you!
