#### **Neuse River Regatta and Dinner**

It was suggested that maybe we should have a race (Regatta) honoring someone who was still alive! Without discussion a name came up. Since this person had been active in all three of the sailing clubs in our area it was decided that all three clubs - FHYC, Blackbeard and Neuse Yacht Racing Association - would join forces to hold a



race to honor this person. One thing led to another and soon preparations were formulated to have an after-race gathering where the awards for the race would be given out and the person to be honored would be highlighted.

Blackbeard Sailing Club offered their club house for the after-race event. Smithfield Chicken and BBQ was contacted to cater the event. After checking everyone's calendar Saturday April 23 was designated as the date. The Committee made up of Georgie Jackson, LuAnn Parins, Stephanie Davies, Doug Longhini, Craig Beavers, Phil Katz, and Ray Redniss put together a budget that would cover the meals and beverages, the sailing awards and the Special Awards for the honoree. Deb Mills was added because she was the official special event coordinator for Blackbeard. We had 70 people signed up for the dinner as many boats were eager to hit the water and race. And then our old friend Covid 19 paid us a visit. As Chair for the event I canceled both the race and the dinner to prevent further spread of the virus among the sailing group and the dinners. Most said they understood the decision.

The committee decided that we would postpone the race rather than cancel it. Another date was checked and October 1, 2022 was decided to be the next opportunity. Blackbeard's club house was available and Smithfield put us on their calendar (they honored the quote they gave us in April). This summer was very hot and humid, many of the sailing events were canceled, so we thought that the October first date would be good, cooler weather and a clear schedule. This time we also told people that they did not have to race in order to register for the dinner. It looked like we were going to be doing a race with good attendance and good dinner participation and then Hurricane Ian decided to raise his ugly head. People were very much aware of the Florence escapade through our ranks and no one wanted to be caught with their boat in a precarious position. Our PRO – Professional Race Organizer – followed the movement of Ian and when Ian did a little turn to the east, the PRO recommended canceling the race so I once again canceled the race. However, Ian was not going to deter the dinner segment of the event!

Our Emcee for the evening was our Past Commodore John Jackson. Our honoree was oblivious that he was going to be honored. I can't believe that no one let the cat out of the bag for nearly a year! When John announced that Bill Jarvis was going to be the honoree, Bill was flabbergasted. John kept Bill in line (no easy task) until all of Bill's experience was presented. Georgie Jackson had been picking Olwen's brain about Bill's background. Georgie created a wonderful Proclamation that was presented to Bill in a beautiful frame. Olwen provide many pictures for a picture board of Bill over the years which created much discussion during the evening.

#### 2023 Membership Renewal Process Kicks Off

It's that time of year again, and starting October 14, the 2023 Online Membership Renewal Process was opened! This year, the most notable aspect of the process is that it's all online, making it quick, easy, and convenient for you to accomplish from your home or office. For those who prefer, a paper process, is also available.

Vice Commodore Dave Phipps introduced the three phase process during the October general meeting.

- Phase One involves an online survey of member demographics and preferences and is intended to provide the Board with quantifiable information on which to base decisions and policies. All members automatically received an email on October 14 with the survey embedded in the email. This allows you to simply check your responses and then submit the form. Dave reports that the process has gone relatively smoothly, and what few issues were reported have been remedied by clicking on the "Fill out directly in Google Forms" button on the top of the survey. This takes you out of your email host and directly to Google Forms, where the survey can also be completed and submitted. The Board of Directors asks for your diligent help in completing the survey but reminds you that only one response is allowed per membership. Survey results will be presented to the membership during the January 12 meeting after the Change of Watch ceremony. Be sure to attend!
- 2. Phase Two, once the survey has been submitted, you will receive another email within a day or two that contains an embedded 2023 Membership Renewal Form. This form is easily completed online; simply type in the requested information. Then please click on the **GREY SUBMIT BUTTON** at the bottom of the page to complete the process.

Please click on the secure link and enter your credit card information. Then click on the **BLUE PAY NOW BUTTON** at the bottom of the page to complete the payment.

This will allow the Yearbook committee adequate time to process data for inclusion in the Yearbook and to allow for production and printing timelines, the deadline for submitting your renewal and payment is December 1. #### Golden Globe Update 10 Oct 2022

The Golden Globe single-handed round the world race, no GPS or electronics on board, set off from Les Sables d'Olonne, France on September 4, 2022. Eighteen sailors representing 11 nationalities are taking part in this series. The boats competing are not modern thoroughbred racers rather they are 32–36-foot monohulls, built before 1988, clearly a lot of upgrades and modifications have been made to prepare the boats for the Southern Ocean, but they are basically still vintage boats such as most of us sail.

The boats had a rough start crossing the Bay of Biscay and by the time the Canary Islands were reached three boats had withdrawn. One boat actually ran onto the rocks at night in the Canary Islands. Others suffered equipment failures which necessitated withdrawal. In addition, various competitors suffered physical injuries, but soldiered on.

The boats are now working their way through the doldrums and into the southern trades. The leading boat is *Clara* sailed by Simon Curwen. However, it is still a very long way to go and there will be further attrition as the boats head south.


#### Ice Cream Social


