# Junior/Youth Sailing in the New Bern Area

It may come as a surprise to some, but we have had youth/junior sailing in New Bern for years. There have been two programs, the New Bern High School Navy Junior ROTC sailors and the Edward Teach Youth Sailing Association. The NJROTC sailing class was started by volunteers from Fairfield Harbour in 2002. ETYSA began in 2008 at Blackbeard Sailing Club.

These organizations shared the goals of giving young people the experience of sailing, and the responsibility of being skippers of their own boats. Sailing is a healthy outdoor experience that uses all the senses and muscles, and it requires

thinking and decision-making, too. The two programs approached it differently and for different ages, but the benefits are clear.

Who is this "Edward" guy? Nowadays pirates are romantic figures, but during his lifetime Blackbeard was an international criminal. He had an alias, one of the names he used was "Edward Teach." So this is a sort of pun on the namesake of Blackbeard Sailing Club. ETYSA began as a small group of Blackbeard Sailing Club members who wanted to get their kids and/or grandkids interested in sailing. The best way is to get the kids all together and make it fun: the next step was to get them boats that they could sail themselves. So a fleet of Optimist Prams was begun.

"Learn by doing" is the main method used by both ETYSA and the NJROTC. Step by step, the students learn all the parts of the boat and how the parts work together.



We get out on the water as soon as is practical, considering weather and readiness of the class. Safety is built into the classes from the beginning, with the kids gaining familiarity with how different and (to landlubbers) unpredictable boats can be.

One of the first things to get out of the way is CAPSIZE! Small sailboats are tippy, and many find this scary. Tipping over can be a disaster to the unskilled, so we take all the students and show them how to cope with their



tipped-over boat. This lesson is very important, and takes place in calm and controlled conditions. It's part of learning how boats behave, realizing the affect of all the forces at work — buoyancy, waves, where you put your weight, momentum (inertia), winds., because nothing afloat ever sits still.

Another lesson gets them out on the water, steering. Unlike any vehicle on land, the direction in which a boat is moving has

no fixed relation to the direction it's pointing. Boats go sideways or backwards quite readily, and this is why docking them can be such a frustrating or comical action. So without the complication of sails, the beginning ETYSA students have a session or two of practicing steering until they are comfortable with making their boats go the direction they want. If you make a game out it, it can be fun!

By now, the beginners have learned to rig their boats, handle them if something goes wrong, and steer them. The last step is get out away from the beach, adventure out into the open water and wind, and SAIL! Because both the NJROTC and ETYSA are long established, the beginners have seen more advanced students taking their boats out sailing. In the NJROTC the senior students were formally tasked with helping run exercises (games, really) for the beginners; ETYSA has a number of junior instructors as part of the staff. But it is a key to both learning and motivation to have big kids enjoying sailing and demonstrating their skills for the beginners. Kids learn fast!

The New Bern NJROTC program was a COVID casualty: ETYSA is going strong. Membership is \$50 per year and this years schedule of classes and activities is currently being worked on. The class limit is 30 for kids ages 8 and up, no prior knowledge or experience is required. **The Edward Teach program is an ongoing success.**
